



THE UNEMPLOYMENT RATE STOOD AT 6.2% AND THE LABOUR UNDERUTILISATION RATE AT 10.9%

June 2024 (definitive estimates):

- The active population (5,392.5 thousand people) decreased from the previous month (0.5%) and from three months before (0.6%), having increased from a year earlier (0.9%).
- The employed population (5,048.0 thousand) decreased from May (0.5%) and from March 2024 (0.4%), having increased from June 2023 (0.8%).
- The unemployed population (344.5 thousand) decreased from the previous month (0.7%) and from three months before (2.6%), having increased from a year earlier (2.7%).
- The unemployment rate stood at 6.4%, the same value as in May, down 0.1 percentage points (pp) from March 2024 and up 0.1 pp from June 2023.
- The inactive population (2,525.4 thousand) increased from the three periods under comparison: 1.4%, 2.0% and 0.6%.
- The labour underutilisation rate was estimated at 11.0%, the same value as in the previous month, but down by 0.2 pp from three months before and by 0.6 pp from a year earlier.

July 2024 (provisional estimates)¹:

- The active population (5,373.0 thousand) decreased from June (0.4%) and April 2024 (0.7%), having increased from July 2023 (0.5%).
- The employed population (5,041.2 thousand) decreased from the previous month (0.1%) and from three months before (0.5%), having increased from a year earlier (0.5%).
- The unemployed population (331.8 thousand) decreased from the three periods under comparison: 3.7%, 4.6% and 0.6%, respectively.
- The unemployment rate stood at 6.2%, down 0.2 pp both from April and June of 2024 and equal to July 2023.
- The inactive population (2,552.9 thousand) increased from the three periods under comparison: 1.1%, 2.5% and 1.6%, respectively.
- The labour underutilisation rate stood at 10.9%, down 0.1 pp both from April and June of 2024 and down 0.6 pp from July 2023.

¹ The estimates for the last reference month (in this case, the quarter centred in July 2024: from June to August 2024) are calculated with incomplete information for the last month of the quarter (August 2024). These estimates will be revised next month (as described in the methodological note).



The Labour Force Survey results presented in this Press Release use weights calibrated with reference to the resident population estimates calculated from the final results of Census 2021.

The back series, from February 2011 onwards, of the Monthly Employment and Unemployment Estimates have been revised and are available at the Statistics Portugal website.

In **June 2024**, the active population decreased from the previous month (27.5 thousand people; 0.5%) due to the decrease of both the employed population (25.1 thousand; 0.5%) and the unemployed population (2.4 thousand; 0.7%). The inactive population increased by 34.2 thousand (1.4%) due, essentially, to the increase of 33.1 thousand (1.4%) in the number of other inactive persons, those not searching for a job nor available to work.

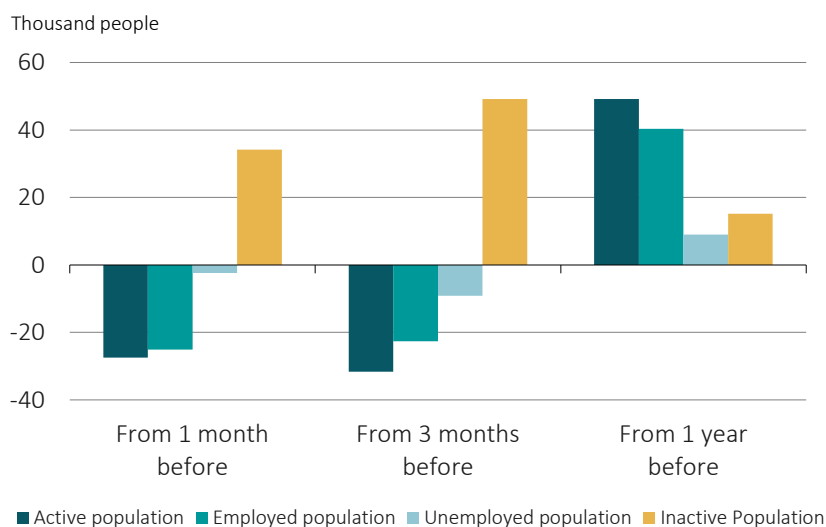
Similarly, from three months before, the active population increased by 31.7 thousand (0.6%) due to the decrease of the employed population (22.6 thousand; 0.4%) and of the unemployed population (9.1 thousand; 2.6%). The inactive population increase by 49.2 thousand people (2.0%) due, mostly, to the increase in the number of other inactive persons (51.9 thousand; 2.2%).

Compared to June 2023, the active population increase of 49.2 thousand people (0.9%) resulted from the increase observed in both the employed population (40.3 thousand; 0.8%) and the unemployed population (9.0 thousand; 2.7%). The inactive population increased by 15.2 thousand (0.6%) due, mainly, to the increase in the number of other inactive persons (36.7 thousand; 1.6%).



These results determined the following changes in the unemployment rate, which stood at 6.4% in June 2024: a null change from May 2024, a negative change of 0.1 pp from March 2024 and a positive change of 0.1 pp from June 2023.

Also in June 2024, labour underutilisation covered 605.6 thousand people, down from the previous month (3.0 thousand; 0.5%), from three months before (19.6 thousand; 3.1%) and from the same month of 2023 (34.0 thousand; 5.3%). The labour underutilisation rate – estimated at 11.0% – remained unchanged from May 2024 and decreased from March of the same year (0.2 pp) and from June 2023 (0.6 pp).

In **July 2024**, compared to the previous month, the active population decreased by 19.5 thousand people (0.4%) and the inactive population increased by 27.5 thousand (1.1%). The change of the active population resulted from the decrease of 6.8 thousand people (0.1%) in the employed population and of 12.7 thousand in the unemployed population (3.7%). The change of the inactive population was mostly the result of the increase in the number of other inactive persons (18.6 thousand; 0.8%)

The decrease observed in the active population compared to three months before (39.8 thousand; 0.7%) resulted from the decrease of the employed population (23.7 thousand; 0.5%) and of the unemployed population (16.1 thousand; 4.6%). The increase of the inactive population (62.0 thousand; 2.5%) was mainly due to the increase in the number of other inactive persons (51.0 thousand; 2.2%).

The active population increased by 24.9 thousand (0.5%) from July 2023 following the increase of the employed population (27.0 thousand; 0.5%) that surpassed the slight decrease of the unemployed population (2.1 thousand; 0.6%). The inactive population increased by 40.9 thousand (1.6%), mainly due to the increase in the number of other inactive persons (46.6 thousand; 2.0%).



These results determined the following changes in the unemployment rate, which stood at 6.2% in July 2024: down 0.2 pp both from June and April of 2024, remaining unchanged from July 2023.

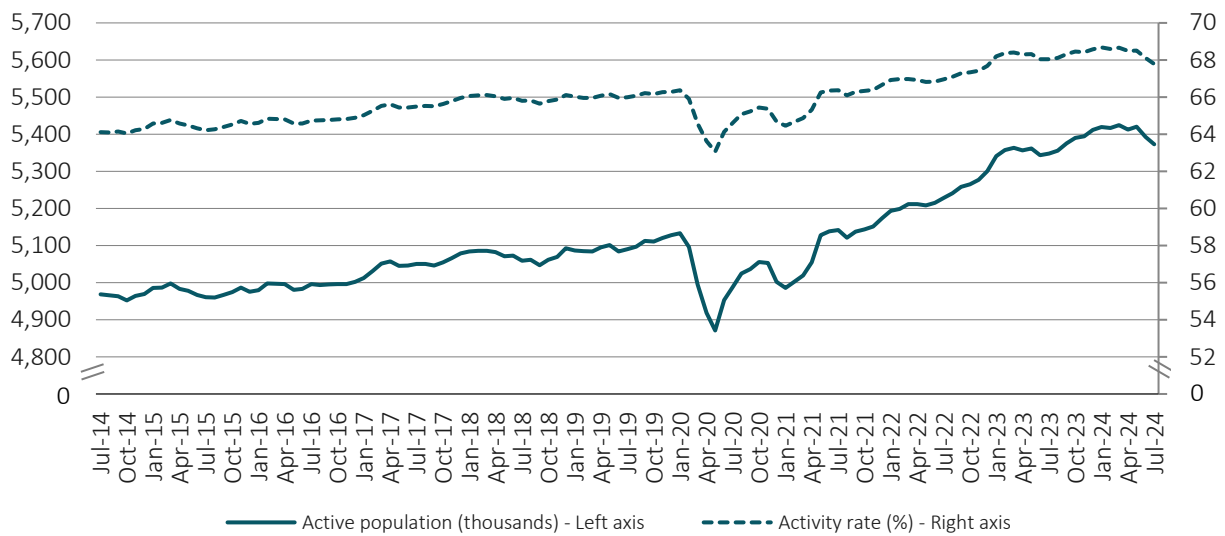
Also in July 2024, labour underutilisation covered 598.8 thousand people, down from the previous month (6.8 thousand; 1.1%), from three months before (13.6 thousand; 2.2%) and from the same month of 2023 (31.3 thousand; 5.0%). The labour underutilisation rate – estimated at 10.9% – decreased by 0.1 pp from both June and April of 2024 and by 0.6 pp from July 2023.



The following figures show the evolution in the last 10 years of the main indicators analysed in this Press Release. In July 2024, the activity rate (67.8%) maintained the downward trend started in March of that same year, when it stood at 68.7%. A similar pattern was observed in the employment rate, which stood at 63.6% in July 2024, the lowest value since March of that year (64.2%).

Figure 3. Active population and activity rate

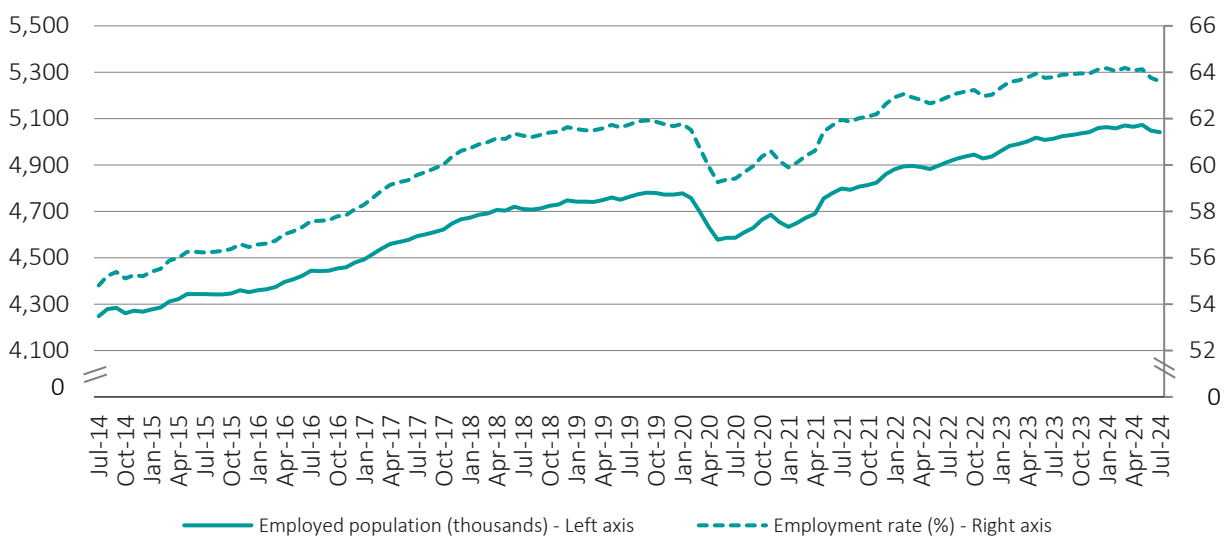

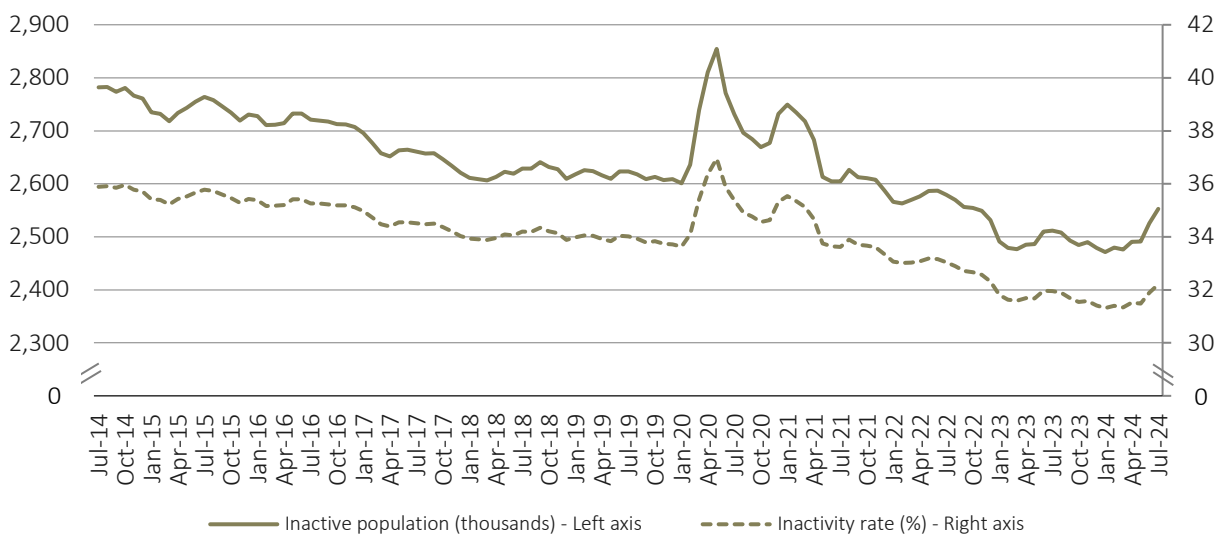
In July 2024, the unemployment rate stood at 6.2%, 0.4 pp below the value observed in January of the same year, while the inactivity rate stood at 32.2%, the highest value since December 2022 (32.3%).

(seasonally adjusted data)

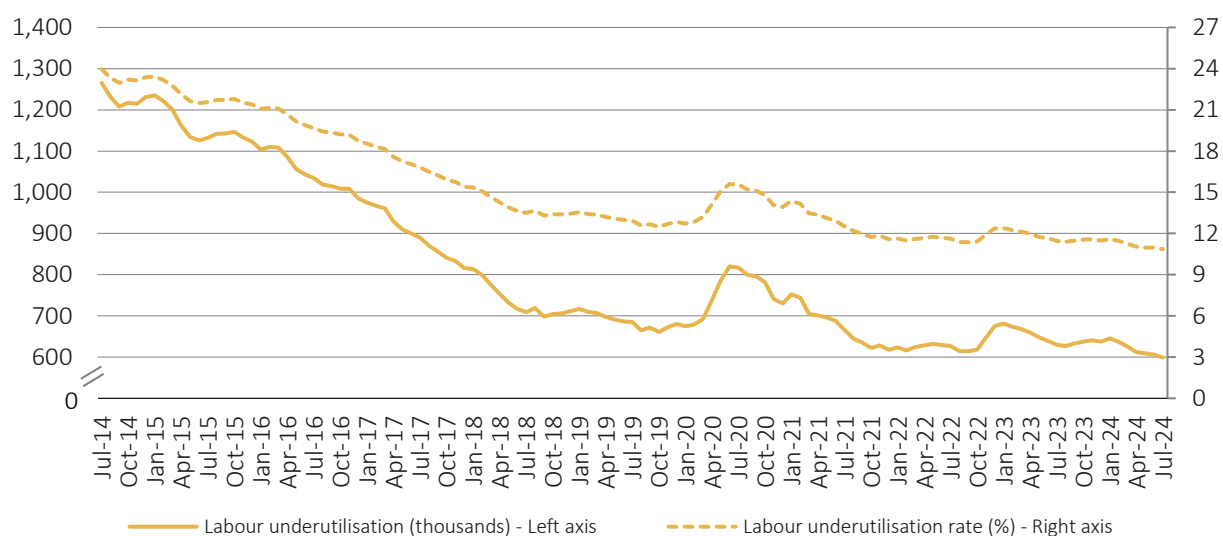

In July 2024, the labour underutilisation covered 598.8 thousand people, corresponding to the lowest value since the beginning of the series in February 2011. The labour underutilisation rate stood at 10.9%, also the lowest value since the beginning of the series.

Criteria used when classifying the population aged 16 to 74 by labour status

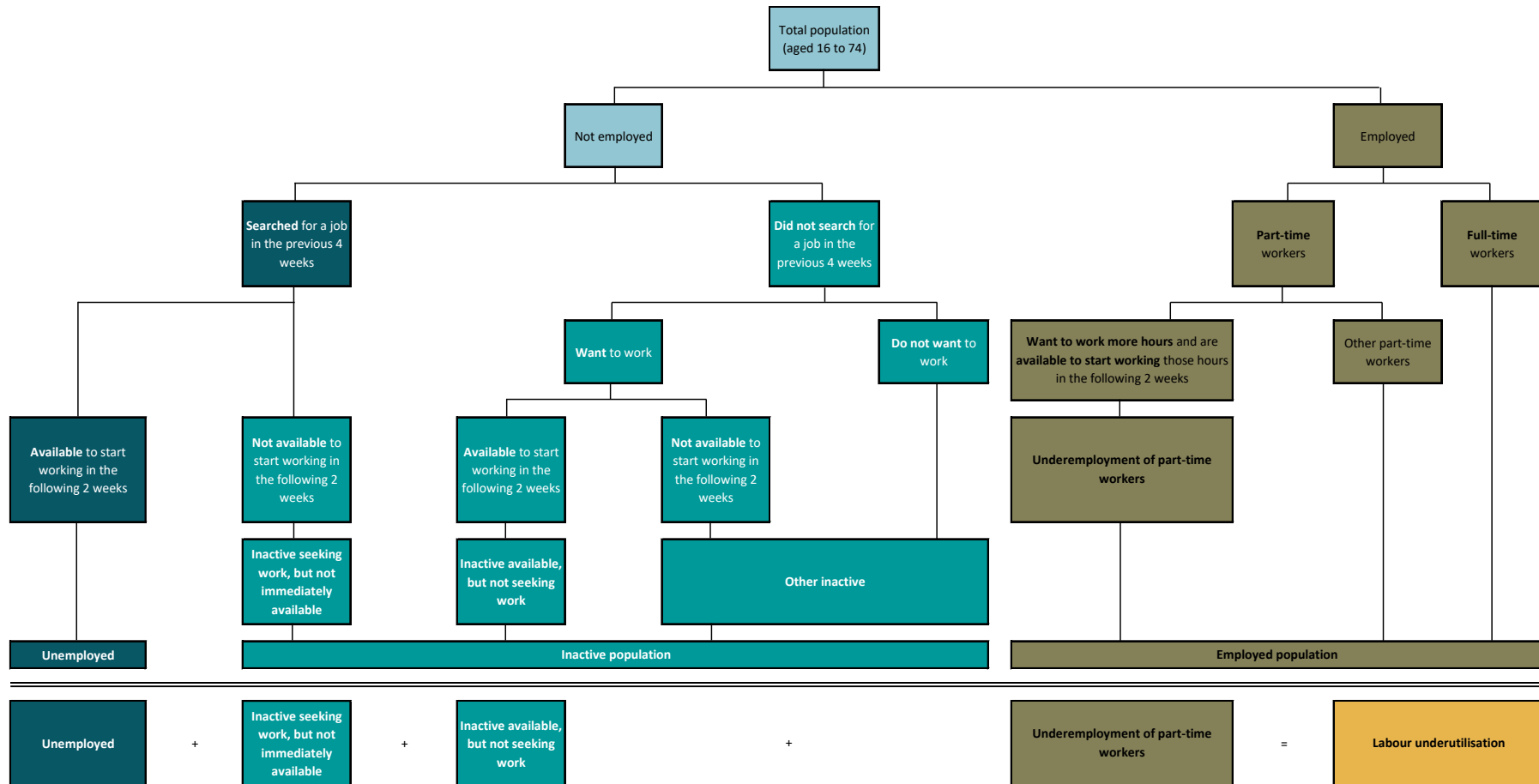

METHODOLOGICAL NOTE

LABOUR FORCE SURVEY

The main purpose of the Labour Force Survey is to classify the population in terms of their participation in the labour market. It is a quarterly sample survey, addressed to all persons living in the national territory.

Most of the characteristics observed in this survey report to the situation in one pre-defined week (from Monday to Sunday), known as reference week. The reference weeks are uniformly distributed throughout the quarters and years. The interviews usually take place in the week following the reference week.

The information is obtained directly, through computer-assisted interview by using a mixed data collection mode: the initial interview is done face-to-face by an interviewer visiting the household and the other five interviews are done by telephone if certain requirements are met. However, it should be noted that, following the COVID-19 pandemic and the measures adopted by the competent authorities, Statistics Portugal has decided, between the first fortnight of March 2020 and the end of the collection of the 2nd quarter of 2022, to suspend the face-to-face collection mode, replacing it exclusively with telephone interviews. After analysing the impact of this suspension, Statistics Portugal decided to incorporate the variable "completed level of education" into the process of calibrating the individual weights of the samples for the 2nd quarter of 2020 to the 3rd quarter of 2023, in addition to the information usually used (monthly estimates of the resident population by sex, age group and region).²

In the 2nd quarter of 2024, the Labour Force Survey weights were calibrated by using the resident population estimates calculated from the final results of Census 2021. The back series (quarterly and annual; from the 1st quarter of 2011 to the 1st quarter of 2024 and from 2011 to 2023) of the estimates released as part of the "Employment Statistics" publication have been revised and are available at the Statistics Portugal Portal. The weights of the Monthly Employment and Unemployment Estimates for the months of February 1998 to January 2011 were calibrated with reference to the independent estimates of the resident population calculated from the final results of the 2011 Census.

MONTHLY EMPLOYMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT ESTIMATES

In 2014, Statistics Portugal initiated a monthly release of Labour Force Survey estimates for the main labour market indicators in addition to the usual quarterly estimates' releases.

With this initiative, Statistics Portugal intends to provide to users monthly updated information on labour market recent developments, allowing, at the same time, a more complete reading picture than that provided so far by Eurostat in its monthly releases of the unemployed population and unemployment rate estimates for Portugal. With this dissemination, Statistics Portugal also satisfies a specific requirement from the PEEIs (Principal European Economic Indicators).

Taking advantage of the continuous nature of the Labour Force Survey collection process, it is possible to monthly obtain estimates related to successive sets of three months (moving quarters), assuring consistency with the quarterly released estimates.

The monthly estimates refer to centred moving quarters, where the reference month (m) corresponds to the central month of each moving quarter. In fact, the reference month of each Press Release corresponds to the central month of the quarter composed by $m-1$, m and $m+1$ months. Therefore, the monthly changes are calculated on values that contain common months. Therefore, the comparison of moving quarters without common months should be done in relation to reference months three months earlier.

The option for disseminating centred moving quarters series aimed at avoiding delays in the detection of turning points in the economic cycle that arise from the use of simple moving averages, but it implies that the estimates for the latest released moving quarter are provisional (see “Revisions” section below).

As estimates of centred moving quarters, the values (not seasonally adjusted) of the reference months February, May, August, and November of each year correspond to the estimates of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th natural quarters, respectively, whose results are published and analysed with greater detail in the quarterly releases of the Labour Force Survey estimates.

The estimates for the last reference month are always provisional, as they correspond to a moving quarter where for the third month the data collection is not completed yet. In fact, for the first two months ($m-1$ and m) the data collection from the Labour Force Survey is already completed, while for the third month ($m+1$) only partially collected data are available.

In this context, in each monthly Press Release the provisional estimates for the reference month and the revised estimates for the previous months are published, due the availability of complete information for the last moving quarter.

INFORMATION AVAILABLE

The data series selected for monthly releases refer to both employed and unemployed population, by sex and age group, and to the corresponding rates. In relation to these data series, it should be noted the following:

- Unless otherwise stated, the data series analysed in this Press Release are seasonally adjusted. For this reason, the analysis focuses on the comparison with the most recent periods. As agreed, Eurostat started using these estimates in its unemployment monthly releases. The original data series (not seasonally adjusted; as in the Statistics Portugal quarterly releases), are available in Tables of the annex.
- The indicators analysed in this Press Release were calculated for the age subgroup of those aged 16 to 74 (as in the Eurostat News Release), which differs from the criterion adopted at the Statistics Portugal quarterly releases (people aged 16 to 89, in line with the concepts in force of the International Labour Organization).



The back series for all the released and analysed indicators in this Press Release, since February 1998 (quarter from January to March 1998), are available at Statistics Portugal website and the links to them can be found in the Excel file released together with this Press Release.

Due to rounding, totals may not correspond exactly to the sum of the parts.

REVISIONS

The monthly released data are subject to regular revisions, as previously mentioned. The revisions come from obtaining the final estimates for the previous reference month (moving quarter) due to the conclusion of its last month collection process. Therefore, in each Press Release the not seasonally adjusted final estimates for the previous reference month are published. In addition, are also presented the final estimates resulting from updating of the seasonally adjusted data series whenever a new observation is added.

Note: With this Press Release, the revision of the Monthly Employment and Unemployment Estimates since February 2011 is published on the Statistics Portugal website, due to the updating of the estimates of the resident population used in the calibration of the weights of the Labour Force Survey after the availability of the final results of the 2021 Census.

SOME CONCEPTS

Unemployed: person aged 16 and 74 who during the reference period met simultaneously the following conditions:

- neither had a job nor was at work;
- had actively sought work, i.e., had actively searched for a paid or unpaid job during the specified period (reference period or the three previous weeks); and
- was available for a paid or unpaid job.

Employed: person aged 16 to 89 who, during the reference period, was in one of the following situations:

- worked for at least one hour for a wage or salary, in cash or in kind (including unpaid family work);
- had a formal attachment to his/her job but was not at work temporarily;
- was in early retirement but working in the reference week.

Working age resident population: Resident population aged 16 to 89.

Active: person aged 16 to 89 who, during the reference period, furnish the supply of labour force for the production of economic goods and services (was employed or unemployed).

Labour force: population formed by all active persons.

Extended labour force: corresponds to the labour force enlarged by the inactive seeking work but not immediately available and the inactive available but not seeking work.



Labour underutilisation: indicator that aggregates the unemployed population, the underemployment of part-time workers, the inactive seeking work but not immediately available, and the inactive available but not seeking work.

Unemployment rate: rate that defines the relation between the unemployed population and the labour force.

$$\text{U.R. (\%)} = (\text{Unemployed population} / \text{Labour force}) \times 100$$

Employment rate: rate that defines the relation between the employed population and the working age population.

$$\text{E.R. (\%)} = (\text{Employed population} / \text{Working age population}) \times 100$$

Activity rate of the working age population: rate that defines the relation between the labour force and the working age population.

$$\text{A.R. (\%)} = (\text{Labour force} / \text{Working age population}) \times 100$$

Inactivity rate of the working age population: rate that defines the relation between the working age inactive population and the working age population.

$$\text{I.R. (\%)} = (\text{Working age inactive population} / \text{Working age population}) \times 100$$

Labour underutilisation rate: rate that defines the relation between the labour underutilisation and the extended labour force.

$$\text{L.U.R. (\%)} = (\text{Labour underutilisation} / \text{Extended labour force}) \times 100$$

For the indicators selected for monthly dissemination, it was considered the age subgroup of those aged 16 to 74.
